The first pichiscite ever held under the to The first plebiscite ever held under the international trusteeship system is currently underway in Togoland under British Administration, a small United Nations trust territory in West Africa. This plebiscite follows a decision of the United Kingdom to grant independence to the neighboring colony of the Gold Coast in conjunction with which British Togoland has been administered for the past 40 years. The Togolese are being asked to state whether they wish to join an independent Gold Coast, or continue under UN trusteeship. The holding of the plebiscite was approved by the Tenth General Assembly and is being conducted under the supervision of a UN Plebiscite Commissioner, assisted by an international corps of observers. Leave Some Honey For The Honeybee

Good honeybee colonies, kept from swarming, will store at least two supers or 60 pounds of honey in a fair year.

But in a good year, this can be increased a third or even more, according to W. A. Stephen, State College extension beekeeper.

He says that the colony on scales at State College has been showing increases up to 10 pounds in a 24hour period. "While this is not excessive and isn't half what has been recorded here, it counts up, particularly if the days preceding have given gains totalling 20 to 50 lbs."

It's only the honey stored on the latter part of the honey flow that the beekeeper can count on as surplus," Stephen says. All the earlier honey is stored in around the brood nest where it serves as stores for the long months ahead when no honey is available.

Stephen advises leaving an additional hive body well-filled with honey or at least a super of honey with the bees when removing the surplus. After all, they've done all 'the

Good Choice Of Enterprises Meant Satisfactory Incomes

Choosing profitable farm enterprises that were adapted to individual farm conditions contributed to satisfactory incomes to many farm families in Western North Carolina last year, according to Charles R. Pugh, State College extension farm management specialist.

Pugh says that in this section of the state, where farm size is genge ally low, test-demonstration famil succeeded by using a combination of crops and livestock that best utilize their available labor.

"For example, dairying and poul-try production during 1955 were generally profitable due to favor-able prices. However, these results having a combination of the two enterprises showed a higher acreage income than those having commercial units in only one."

Pugh says that increasing rates of production have been effective in raising farm income, too, particu-larly in an area with small farms. Production hay and forage on the

farm has promoted efficient livestock production. As an example, ne says farmer in Haywood County spent less than \$100 for feed for his 40 cows. He produced the rest on the

In addition to not cash incom from the farm, many farm families improved their wall-being by engag-ing in off-farm work and producing much of their food supply at home, Pugh said.

Save Baby Pines For Later Day

This year, Tar Heel timber owners should be especially careful with fires, warns R. S. Douglass, State College extension forestry special-

Douglass says that in some cases, armers will lose several dollars per cee in baby pines if their woodland ns. "The heavy pine seed crop ast fall is showing up now in the large number of baby pines coming up in the woods."

The forester points out that only once in several years is there a good crop of seed. Most woodlands need more pines in them and these good seed years help improve the

Douglass says that these tiny pines are only a few inches tall now and have no sale value. But they have a very real value in the promise of future timber growth.

He concludes: "Good tree farmers will make a special effort to protect these 'babies' because they know it will pay off in more and better timber for sale later."
