

ly into the soil. "The amount of lime needed to increase the pH of the soil to a suitable level will depend on various characteristics, such as organic matter and clay content, as

well as on the degree of acidity. Your best guide for liming is a soil test made on a sample properly collected to represent the, soil in each field in your farm."

Soil tests can be obtained free from the State Department of Agriculture's Soil 'Testing Laboratory, which also advises farmers as to the quantity of lime or fert-

ilizer to be added for various crops. For further information about having soil samples analyzed, the county agent advised farmers to visit his office or contact one of the other local agricultural agencies. Now is a good time to have

"The desirable soil pH, or lime level, varies with the crop being planted in a rotation," Mr. Silver continued. "Legumes such as al-

falfa and Ladino clover grow best in soils that have been limed sufficiently to raise the pH above 6.0. The importance of the correct soil pH for alfalfa and Ladi-

no clover is demonstrated by Experiment Station data. "A test plot with a 5.4 pH gave

an alfalfa yield of only 587 lbs. per acre. When the pH was boosted to 6.5 by the addition of lime the yield was increased to 4,416

pounds per acre. "Similarly with Ladino clover, the yield was increased from 1,-084 pounds an acre to 6,278 lbs.
