North Carolina Facts What is the State motto? The words "Esse Quam Videri" ere adopted as the motto of

Assembly in 1893.

These Latin words translated nto English mean "to be rather than to seem." Their origin can be traced to an essay on Friendship written by Cicero, one of the great Romans. (Cicero de Amicita, chapter 26.)

Nearly every state has adopted a motto, generally in Latin. The reason for their mottoes being in Latin is that the Latin language is far more condensed and terse than the English.

Until 1893 North Carolina was did not have a motto and the only one of the original thirteen states without one

The motto appears on the Great Seal of the State.

What are official State colors? Red and blue. They are of the shades as adopted and appearing in the North Carolina flag and the American flag. These colors were adopted by the General Assembly in 1945.
