7. It would be impossible to maintain uniform standards in multiple private schools.

8. Operation of private school would open the door for political graft and corruption in use of Bowman and Marshall recovered State funds.

9. The plan would encourage agitators to clamor for the closing of schools whenever Negro citizens seek admission to them.

10. The proposed amendment offers the citizens of North Carolina no alternatives. The implication is that the Pearsall Plan is the only answer.
