# Light Quake Shakes W.N.C; **Is Felt in Marshall Area**

#### **Rumblin Noise Accompanies Five-Second Earth** Movement

A dish-rattling, window-shaking earthquake rumbling through Western North Carolina and sec tions of the foothills Monday, produced fright but no reported damage.

The tremors were felt between 9:25 and 9:30 a. m., and were reported in Burke, Catawba, Rutherford, Lincoln, Cleveland, Madison, Mitchell, Avery, McDowell Buncombe and Henderson coun ties. It lasted about 5 seconds.

John Self of Rollins said he was working at a desk in the Crown Oil Co. plant when the room began shaking so violently that it threw his arm off the desk. He said an adding machine and type writer rattled.



#### First Witnesses Heard On Wednesday; Trial Continues

The government yesterday launched in U. S. District Court in Asheville its case against 10 politically prominent Madison Democrats who are accused of conspiring to "fix" the November 1954, general election in Madison. Selection of a jury, composed of 12 Democrats, and examination of three witnesses consumed all of the opening day action in the three-year-old case.

The defendants are accused o onspiring to stuff Madison County ballot boxes with illegal ab sentee votes, fictitious, forged and fraudulent ballots and using un qualified or disqualified voters to swing the vote their way.

The government claims the al ored election irregularities vio ated Madison County citizens' constitutional rights, in as much as the election was, in part, for a U. S. Senator and Representa-

Defendants in the case, which was dismissed in May of last year by Judge Wilson Warlick, who is presiding again, are Zeno Ponder, former chairman of the Madison County board of elections; E. Y. Ponder, Madison County sheriff, and B. K. Meadows, Arthur E. Cantrell, LeRoy Shelton, W. T. Moore, Roy Freeman, Merit Whitt, Jeff Whitt and James W. Baldwin, lesser functionaries in the 1954 election.


