The UNC-Clemson encounter will mark the first time in the history of the ACC that a regular season basketball game has been televised on a regional basis.

Every team in the conference will participate in at least one televised game with the champion Tar Heels scheduled for five appearances.

Maryland will play Navy on February 1 in the only non-conference affair. The remaining ten games will all be conference clashes.

WBTV is also anticipating carrying the ACC tournament finals which will be played in Raleigh on March 8. However, plans for telecasting the finals have not yet been cleared.

Jimmy Simpson will describe the play-by-play action and Bill Creasy will handle the color commentary for the telecasts.
