V. Farmer, of whom the ruling was sharply critical, appealed the order issue Monday by Judge J. Frank Huskins. The appeal was perfected before Judge Huskins Tuesday by W. E. Anglin and G. D. Bailey of Burnsville, attorneys for Blankenship and Farmer. Judge Huskins' order had ac-
