
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Fairview Man Is Allegedly LIONS BROOM Beer Can

Clarence Shelton, 41, of Fairview, near Asheville, was charg ed with murder Saturday night in the beer-can beating of Samuel D es, 43, also of Fairview, Madison County Sheriff E. Y. Ponder

reported. Jones was found, dead in an auto parked near an Asheville cafe_early Friday after his companion had gone into the restaurant and Clark told a woman there that they had a dead man in the car.

The sheriff said Jones apparently had been slugged with full beer cans in the auto in the Shelton Laurel section Thursday afternoon and died some time before 6 p. m. He said the investigation showed Jones, sitting in the front seat, was hit by the cans thrown by Snelton, who was in the back seat.


The officer said he was informed that the others, thinking that Jones had simply passed out from too much whisky, put him in the back seat and drove to Asheville.
