Rev. L. Richard Mellin, P. O. Box, 257, Marshall, and pastor of the Marshall Presbyterian Church, has been elected a commissioner to the General Assembly of the new United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., to be held in Pittsburgh, Pa., May 28 to June 4.

The historic event will mark the formation of the new church through the merger of the 170year-old Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and the 100-year-old United Presbyterian Church of North America.

As the supreme governing body of the church, the General Assembly will act on all details of bringing together the two denominations and planning the future program of the new united church with its more than three million members.
