North Carolina Wheat Farmers Favor Quotas

Preliminary returns from the terendum held Friday, June 20 the 36-State wheat producing mers voting favored marketquotas for the 1959 wheat er for the Agricultural Stabilstion and Conservation Commitorth Carolina show that a total TWO ARRESTED of 1,207 votes were cast. Of this total, 92.5 percent favored marketing quotas on the 1959 crop. National returns show a total of 108,210 votes counted. Of these, 165,668 favored marketing quotas and 32,342 opposed quotas. Although this is a preliminary tabulation, the final total is not expected to show any significant change from these preliminary figures, according to Godfrey.

Because wheat marketing quotas which were proclaimed for the 1959 crop by Secretary of Agriculture Beneon in April of this year are affective only when approved by two-thirds or more of a farmers voting in a referent marketing quotas will be in fact next year.
