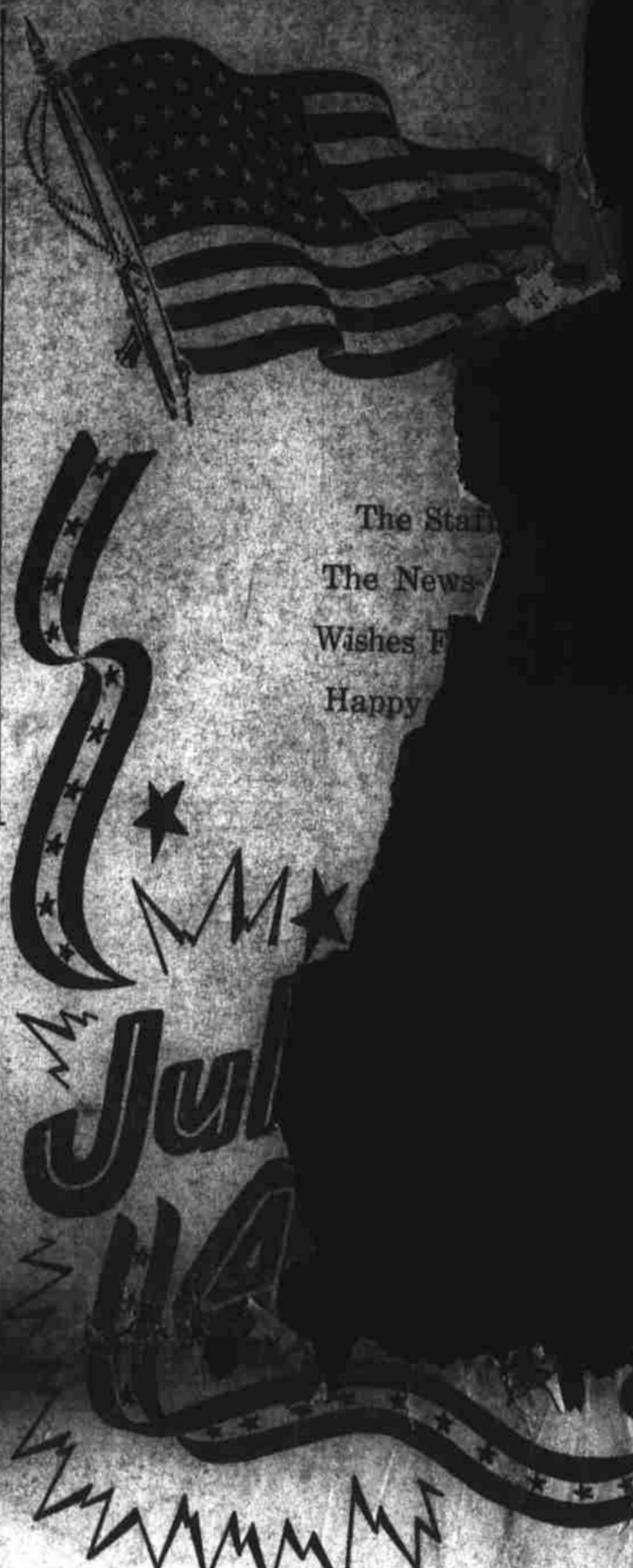
## Sorenson Named As Representative By N.C. Forestry Asso.

### New Procedures For Shortpaid Mail Now In Effect

F. Ray Frisby, Marshall postmaster, stated this week that under authority of Public Law 85-371, approved April 9, 1958, post offices throughout the country were ordered to place the new procedures for handling short paid mail into effect on July 1, 1958, in accordance with the wishes of the Congress. All unpaid or insufficiently prepaid mail is now sorted for the amount of the deficient postage plus a shortpaid charge of 5 cents and dispatched for delivery to the addressee upon payment of the charges marked on the mail.

Also, under authority of the new law, the fee for returning dead letters and dead first-class parcels to senders by the Dead Letter Office was increased from 5 cents to 10 cents, each effective July 1, 1958, Mr. Frisby said.

It was announced here this week that in addition to the regular 4th of July holiday at all banks, Governor Luther Hodges has proclaimed July 5th also as a holiday for banks in North Carolina.

This means that all banks in Madison County will be closed on Friday, July 4th and Saturday July 5th, it was stated.

### North Carolina Wheat Farmers Favor Quotas

Preliminary returns from the referendum held Friday, June 20 in the 36-State wheat producing area show that 83.7 percent of the farmers voting favored marketing quotas for the 1959 wheat crop. According to H. D. Godfrey, State Administrative Officer for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, preliminary returns for North Carolina show that a total of 1,207 votes were cast. Of this total, 92.5 percent favored marketing quotas on the 1959 crop. National returns show a total of 198,210 votes counted. Of these, 185,868 favored marketing quotas and 32,342 opposed quotas. Although this is a preliminary tabulation, the final total is not expected to show any significant change from these preliminary figures, according to Godfrey.

Because wheat marketing quotas which were proclaimed for the 1959 crop by Secretary of Agriculture Benson in April of this year are effective only when approved by two-thirds or more of the farmers voting in a referendum, marketing quotas will be in effect next year.

### TWO ARRESTED AT STILL SITE

A 56-gallon steamer-type still and 150 gallons of mash were destroyed near Hot Springs during the weekend by Alcohol and Tobacco Tax investigators, it was reported this week. The officers also destroyed eight and one-half gallons of whiskey.

Two men were arrested at the still, which was in full operation. They are Aus Inman King, 38, and Bearlin Aikens, 30, of Madison County. They made bonds of \$500 each for appearance in the November criminal term of U. S. Court.

A third man, John William Warner, 73, was also charged with being affiliated with the other men and the still. The still had been set up on his property and the officers testified water was being piped from his well line to the still. He also posted bond for \$500 for District Court appearance.
