FIRE GUTS HUFF'S United Fund Campaign Is Underway CAFE IN HOT SPRINGS FRI.

A fire apparently started by faulty wiring in the kitchen de-Cafe in mid-town Hot Springs about 3 a. m., Friday.

Fire Chief Bill Whitten reported the ceiling of the adjoining service station of the combination business also was damaged. He said no one was injured but the damages would run between

\$8,000 and \$10,000. He said the blaze was discovered between 2:45 a. m., and 3 a. m., by a passing motorist, who telephoned Mayor Joe R. Hen-

derson at his home. The volunteer firemen found the blaze raging, but managed to keep it confined inside the build-

The building's lot is adjacent to one occupied by Mayor Henderson's cafe, service station and

The fire-stricken business was operated by Swann Huff of Hot Springs, and the building is owned by E. W. Plemmons of Marshall, Whitten said.

It was the first fire there since April 1957 when a frame house beyond reach of the fire department lines burned.

Before that, the last one in the main part of town broke out Sept. 30, 1955 at a service station. Whitten said.
