SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

This is the fifth in a series of articles on the 1958 amendments to the Social Security Law by George F. Leinwall, of the Asheville social security office, and field representative for Madison County.

An estimated 180,000 dependents of disabled workers are now eligible to receive social security benefits. The new amendments permit benefit payments to the wife of a disabled worker at age 62, to his children under age 18, or to his totally disabled child over age 18 whose disability was sustained prior to his 18th birthday; wives under age 62 are eligible for mother's benefits as long as these children are in her care.

These payments are not automatic, and application for benefits must be filed with the social security office. So that all eligible dependents of disabled workers may be aware of their rights under the new provisions, social security offices are enclosing notices with the monthly checks that are being sent out to disabled workers.

Another group of dependents is now eligible for benefit payments
