Proper Light (Brought From First Page)

Light is very important, stated **Printess W. England**, assistant county agent, here this week. Natural daylight has been used extensively in the past by farmers. Usually light from the north is best.
Electric lights are being used by more and more progressive tobacco growers. Some of the advantages of using artificial lights are:
1. They supply uniform light throughout the day.
2. The work day can be lengthened.
3. Color of tobacco can be judged more accurately with electric lights.
4. Eye strain can be reduced by using suitable electric lamps.
5. Tobacco can be prepared for market quicker.
Studies have shown that a four foot fluorescent light fixture using two tubes is satisfactory. These tubes should be one 40-watt Deluxe cool white and one 40-watt daylight fluorescent tube combination for best results. This light should be suspended three feet above the work table as

are eligible is one of the functions of the agency's county office located at Marshall, the county supervisor pointed out. Each county has a 3-member county committee, and one of its duties is to determine whether or not an applicant is eligible for a loan. To be eligible, the applicant must be a farm owner or operator, with necessary experience, whose credit requirements for soil and water conservation improvements cannot be supplied through private or cooperative sources.
The agency has completed approximately four years of making soil and water conservation loans under the present program Mr. Anderson said. During that time approximately 7,250 individual farm families throughout the nation, plus 141 associations serving approximately 5,200 families, have borrowed \$43,100,000. About 80 percent of this total helped farmers develop farm water and irrigation systems. This included building canals, ditches and piping, drilling wells, and constructing and repairing irrigation ditches and laterals. Farmers used the rest of the loan funds to develop livestock and household water systems, and for soil conservation practices such as terracing, improved pastures, drainage, clearing and tree planting.
For the present fiscal year Congress made \$5,500,000 available for direct soil and water conservation loans. This is in addition to a larger amount which local banks or other private lenders may advance for this type of loan, with repayment in full insured by the Farmers Home Administration.

on the markets in this area.
(2) Giving farmers an opportunity to sell steers on a graded basis.
(3) Setting a price pattern for the field buyers for shipping cattle and to sell on the regular market.
(4) Lessening the rush on the normal weekly livestock markets.
The number of farmers in Madison County consigning steers to the organized sale has gradually increased since the sales started. Many of the original consignors sell every steer they produce each year through the organized steer sale. As Mr. Merritt Howell, of the Laurel Branch section, stated, "I feel that the steer sales have really been worthwhile to me. I can say that I have averaged about 2c per pound more than if I had sold on the regular market."
This would certainly be true for Mr. Howell in the absence of any organized steer sale and to many other farmers producing yearling steers which reach the maximum value when placed in the feed lots of grain farmers in other sections of the country.

Carolina who will serve for one year or until their successors are named and seated. The primary duty of the county committee is to administer all National Farm Programs assigned to it by Congress and the Secretary of Agriculture in accordance to the prescribed procedures and regulations, and under the general directions and supervision of the State ASC Committee. Programs applicable to Madison County are:

- (1) Acreage allotment and marketing quotas on tobacco and wheat.
 - (2) The Agricultural Conservation Program (known as ACP).
 - (3) Price support loans, purchase agreements, and incentive payments.
 - (4) The Soil Bank Program.
 - (5) Any feed emergency or other programs which the Congress or Secretary may assign.
- Another important duty of the county ASC Committee is to make recommendations as to needed changes in programs and regulations through the State ASC Committee and the Secretary of Agriculture.
The regulations governing the election of the county committee stresses the necessity of electing farmers who are best qualified for county committee work and who will be representative of the various sections and types of agriculture in the county and will give sufficient time to successfully direct the farm programs at the county level.
