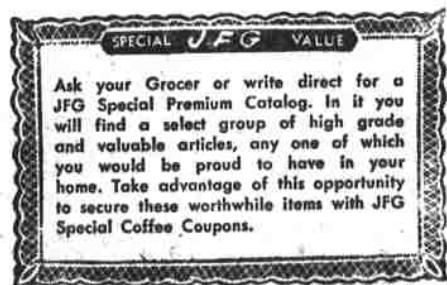

MOTOR VEHICLE INSPECTION

The need for a careful inspection of the condition of automobiles that use our highways at high speed is apparent. We are glad that practically all of our states require by law that motor vehicles be carefully inspected at regular intervals.
