Two Marshall Men Killed In Wreck COURT ADJOURNS Mars Hill J V's Win Both



Reeves Fisher, Lee Roy Pegg Both Were Well-Known

John Reeves Fisher, 33, and Lee Roy Pegg, 36, both well--Marshall Businessmen, died in a one-automobile accident n U. S. 25-70 about 11 miles rom Marshall at 1:15 o'clock inday morning, February 22,

Fisher and Pegg were coming toward Marshall after they had been bowling in Asheville Saturday night when the 1957 Pontiac went out of control on a curve, carrying both to their deaths.

Patrolman Capell, who investigated the accident, listed Fisher as driver of the car in which the two men were killed. He said the vehicle ran along the shoulder of the road about 45 feet, travelled nother 195 feet sideways and inally rolled down a 69-foot emnt near the French Broad
