

Home Demonstration Clubs To Benefit This Month By Getting New Subscriptions

All Clubs To Be Active; New Subscribers Sought

The News-Record, in cooperation with the home demonstration clubs of Madison County, announced a plan this week that would benefit all clubs as well as increase subscribers during September.

The project was accepted last Thursday when the Madison County Home Demonstration Council met at the REA Building here.

Marion Wilson, home demonstration agent, explained the project as follows:

HOT SPRINGS MAN CAUGHT AFTER CHASE

A Hot Springs man, wanted by federal authorities on charges of violating probationary sentence terms, was arrested Tuesday near Greenville, Tenn., following a two-hour police chase by 277.

Clarence Massey, 37, was placed in the federal station of Buncombe County last about 11:30 Tuesday to await a hearing before Judge Wilson Watkins in U. S. District Court in Asheville next week.

Four police cars participated in the chase which began about 8 a. m., and ended about 10 a. m. When Massey was apprehended on Newport highway near Greenville.

Deputies from the office of U. S. Marshal Roy Harmon, members of the Greenville Police Department, and Alcohol-Tobacco-Tax Unit investigators took part.

Massey was convicted at the November, 1935 term of federal court in Asheville of violating federal internal revenue liquor laws. He received an 18-month suspended sentence and was placed on probation under court conditions.

In February of this year, Massey escaped from a prison camp at Lake Worth, Fla., where he was serving time for a misdemeanor, deputy said.

STATE HAS 123 POLIO CASES, 104 PARALYTIC

Raleigh — North Carolina's 1936 total of polio cases rose to 123 Tuesday with reports of three new cases in Cumberland.

Dr. M. T. Foster, Cumberland health officer, said Hope Mills health officer had been closed off to swimmers because of the polio toll that has struck 23 persons in the county so far this year.

The State Department of Health said 104 of the 123 cases that had been reported to it by Tuesday were paralytic. As of the same date a year ago only 54 cases of polio had been reported in the state.

BONDS FOR THREE SET IN AUTO THEFT CASE

Bonds for three Greenville, S. C. youths charged with violating the Dryer Act were set at \$2,000 each by U. S. Commissioner Lawrence Stoker of Asheville Tuesday. They were arrested in Hot Springs Saturday, riding in a car reported stolen from Greenville.

Since taking a stolen car across a state line constitutes a federal offense, local authorities turned the youths over to deputies from the office of U. S. Marshal Roy Harmon.

They were identified as Gerald Thomas Nicholson, 16, William Lee Vaughn, 20, and a juvenile, all of Greenville.

TWO INDUCTED, OTHERS ENLIST FOR SERVICE

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12-Year-Old Son Of Clyde Peek In Critical Condition

Five Madison County people were injured, one critically, in a two-car collision in Mars Hill about 3:30 p. m. Monday.

The critically injured victim is Herbert Clyde Peek Jr., 12, who was riding with his father, about 38, Mars Hill High School football coach. Both are now in the St. Joseph's Hospital in Asheville. The elder Peek's condition is improved but his son remains in critical condition, it was reported today.

Admitted to Memorial Mission Hospital were Bill Jarvis, about 18, said to be the driver of the other car; and Jack Thompson, 17, both of near Mars Hill. Jarvis suffered a fractured jaw and Thompson suffered a fracture of the shoulder.

Woody Ammons, riding with Jarvis and Thompson, was also treated at Memorial Mission.

Police Chief C. A. Duck, who investigated, said that the Peek car and the auto driven by Jarvis met nearly head-on on a curve of N. C. 213.

He said no charge has been filed pending outcome of H. C. Peek's condition. The hospital said the boy suffered a fracture of the skull, a crushed chest, lacerations of the head and both sides of the face and mouth, and fractures of ribs and right leg.

He said the high father suffered lacerations of the forehead, left ear and lower lip and left arm of the face and of the right arm.
