Hot Springs Plans Big 4th Of July Celebration

Proceeds To Be Used For Summer Recreation Program

Elaborate plans are being made for the Fourth of July in Hot Springs. Starting at 10:00 a. m., a full day's program will come to close with a street dance starting at 9:00 p. m. Proceeds from the events will be used to help defray expenses of the Summer Recreation Program for Hot Springs. The program Monday is being sponsored by the Civic Clubs of Hot Springs and a huge crowd is expected.

At 10 o'clock Monday morning, a skeet, trap and pistol shoot. At 12:00 Noon, a Babe Ruth All Star game will pit a select group of players from Marshall and Mars Hill versus a picked team composed of players from Hot Springs, Walnut and Laurel. At 2:00 o'clock the Annual Madison County League All-Star game will be played. The host team, not yet determined, (either Marshall or Laurel), will play a selected team from the other four clubs in the league.

Bingo will be played at 5:00 o'clock and the Lions Club of Hot Springs will sponsor a fish fry on the Hot Springs Inn lawn between 5:00-7:30 o'clock.

At 8:30, free fireworks will be displayed and this event will be followed by the street dance which will be called by Bill Whitten.

SAVINGS BOND SALES AHEAD OF LAST YEAR

The sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds in North Carolina continued to strengthen. May sales were over 6% higher than May, 1959.

For Series E Bonds alone, May sales were the best since 1958. Purchases were 4% higher than in May, 1959.

The sales for Series H Bonds were 33% above a year ago.

The combined sales of both Series E and H, for the first five months of this year, amounted to \$20,880,381. This is an increase of 4% over 1959 and the largest sales volume since 1956 for this period.

OFFICERS TO CHECK ON LOCAL TAX RETURNS

Within the next few days officers of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service will begin a compliance survey of many Madison County business firms to determine whether taxpayers are aware of an complying with Federal tax laws requiring filing of various types of tax returns.

J. E. Wall, District Director at Greensboro, said that revenue officers conducting the survey will check on filing of tax returns covering business-income, employers' Social Security, withholding tax and excise tax. Wall added that the survey should be completed within about one month.

Director Wall emphasized that the survey is not designed to audit tax returns but to determine the public's awareness and the extent of compliance with the filing requirements of the Internal Revenue laws.

Wall pointed out that compliance surveys of this type are required by the Internal Revenue Code and are a part of the Service's tax enforcement program.

The survey will probably bring to light some instances of delinquency in filing required returns. (Continued To Last Page)

BEECH GLEN GROUP WISHES TEACHERS KEPT

Mr. T. D. Metcalf, who headed a delegation which appeared before the board of education recently in regard to retaining two teachers at Beech Glen, has the following to say this week:

"A front page article appeared in last week's News-Record entitled 'Beech Glen Delegation Seeks Teachers.' The true interpretation and purpose of this action was to keep good teachers at Beech Glen Grammar School, Mr. Metcalf writes.

"There was not an explanation as to why the top members of the faculty were chosen for dismissal. These teachers who held Grade A and Master's Degree certificates, whose past records as instructors were unquestionably high, were dismissed." Mr. Metcalf said.

"The above mentioned delegation, voicing the opinions of parents and taxpayers, demand a retention of standards in a matter so greatly affecting the lives of our future generation at this critical period of training. We, as parents, like to feel that we are able to meet at any time when conditions necessitate, with a group to whom the responsibility of maintaining the highest standards for our schools has been entrusted.

"We would like to express our appreciation to the board of education for their efforts to retain these principles where facts of existing conditions in that locality are presented and correction are made by the reinstatement of the two highest quality teachers who were recently dismissed." Mr. Metcalf concluded.

Walter D. Nolte Is Named Hammarlund Vice-President

County Gives Sanford 3118 Votes; Lake Gets 340

Terry Sanford Saturday captured the Democratic nomination for governor in North Carolina's hotly-contested runoff primary which featured bitter debate on handling the school segregation-integration problem.

Several state Democratic party leaders agreed this was an important factor in Sanford's tremendous victory.

Unofficial returns from all but 17 of the state's 2,094 precincts gave Sanford 352,945 votes to 275,512 for Lake, who campaigned as a last-ditch segregationist. This was 56.2 per cent for Sanford and 43.8 per cent for Lake.

It was the second highest Tar Heel vote on record. The highest, 658,000, was set in the first primary May 28 when Sanford built up an 87,771-vote lead over Lake in the four-man race.

The state's 100 county boards of election met Tuesday to canvass and certify the returns. The State Board of Elections meets July 5.

Sanford, supporter of North Carolina's Pearsall Plan for handling the school segregation issue, said "I don't know whether the people will ever be satisfied with the way the segregation problem is being handled, but I know they have confidence in our plan."

The Pearsall Plan has resulted in token integration at some schools in a few Tar Heel cities. Lake, 53, a former assistant attorney general, pledged during his campaign that if elected he would create a climate of public opinion against integration. He assailed Sanford's proposed spending program, declaring it would either bankrupt the state or require big tax increases.

Sanford, boyish-looking 42-year-old attorney from Fayetteville, campaigned on the promise for a new day of progress in North Carolina. He emphasized the importance of increased spending for education.
