

Clyde M. Roberts Unseats Canipe For State Senate

In one of the "heaviest" elections ever held in Madison County, the Democratic candidate won in every race. Although it was a sweep for the Democrats, tremendous gains were noted in the Republican columns.

Republican Clyde M. Roberts. Marshall attorney, was victorious in his bid for the State Senate in the 30th Senatorial District. He unseated Democratic incumbent Albert Campe. The District is composed of four counties -Madison, Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey. Mr. Roberts received 14,375 votes to Mr. Canipe's 10,-
