Madison County farmers have shown a steady increase in farm sales for the past several years. Sales of crops and livestock have climbed liked steps as follows:

This increase in volume was ac complished with a decreasing number of farms and people living on farms.

Some of the more interesting changes in farm sales from Madison County are as follows:

From Tobacco: 1956, \$2,965,-657; 1957, \$3,064,755; 1958, \$3,-257,096; 1959, \$3,119,848; 1960, \$8,277,828.

From Milk: 1956, \$405,856; 1957, \$483,692; 1958, \$497,550; 1959, \$546,480; 1960, \$565,380.
