

Nealey Bradburn, a cord producer in the Worley Cove section of the county, receives his advance pay-ment as the first participant in the 1961 Feed Grain Program from Dorothy Sprinkle, administrative clerk, at the local ASC office. This advance payment of \$298.00 represents approximately half the payment which Mr. Bradburn expects to earn for diverting a portion of his corn base to conservation uses under the new program. The remainder of his payment will be made in late summer after performance has been checked on the farm. Mr. Bradburn says that par-ticipation in the feed grain program will enable him to retire a portion of his cropland to conservation uses, thereby giving the diverted toreage a rest from production of soll depleting crops and that the pay-ment received will be used to help finance his 1961 farm operations and to purchase any meded field Nealey Bradburn, a cord producer in the Worley
