## NEWS from the Services



(AHTNC) -- PFC James E. Buckner, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mert Buckner, Route 5, Marshall, N. C., recently re-enlisted in the Regular Army while serving with the 31st Infantry at Fort Rucker, Ala. Buckner, who entered the Army in April 1956, is a cameraman in the infantry's Combat Support Company. He attended Marshall High School and was engaged in farming prior to entering the Army. His wife, Maxine, lives in Ozark, Ala.

Ludwigsburg, Germany (AHTNC) -- Grady C. Worley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton W. Worley, Mars Hill, N. C., recently was promoted to specialist five in Germany where he is a member of the 4th Transportation Battalion. Specialist Worley, a mechanic in the battalion's 126th Transportation Company in Ludwigsburg, entered the Army in February 1957, was last stationed at Fort Jackson, S. C., and arrived overseas in June 1957.

The 21-year-old soldier is a 1956 graduate of Mars Hill High School. His wife, Edda, is with him in Germany.

Fort Hood, Tex. (AHTNC) -- Army Pvt. Grady C. Rice, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Rice, Route 1, Flag Pond, Tenn., participated in Exercise Thunder Bolt, a nine day joint Army-Air Force training exercise at Fort Hood, Texas, which ended April 27.

Participating units were rated on their capability to operate over wide frontages as independent forces under simulated nuclear and limited warfare conditions. The exercise was designed to test the effectiveness of the ground and air forces involved and culminated a year's training.

Rice, a truck driver in Service Battery of the 1st Armored Division's Artillery at Fort Hood, entered the Army in September 1960 and received basic training at Fort Knox, Ky.

The 21-year-old soldier is a 1958 graduate of Unicoi County High School.

Fort Riley, Kan. (AHTNC) -- Army Recruit Benajah L. Gahagan, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter W. Gahagan, RFD 3, Marshall, N. C., is receiving eight weeks of advanced individual heavy-weapons training with the 1st Division at Fort Riley, Kan. The training is scheduled to end May 20.

Gahagan is being trained in infantry unit combat tactics and handling and firing heavy-infantry weapons, including the recoilless rifle and the 81 millimeter mortar.

He entered the Army last January and completed basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C.

Gahagan is a 1958 graduate of Walnut High School and attended Mars Hill College. He was employed by the Anson Western Company in Anson, Ill., before entering the Army.

### THANKSGIVING

God's verdict upon the pagan world is that "they are without excuse, because, when they knew God, they glorified Him not as God, neither were thankful..." (Rom. 1:20,21). The Psalmist, on the other hand, declares:

"IT IS A GOOD THING TO GIVE THANKS UNTO THE LORD, AND TO SING PRAISES UNTO THY NAME, O MOST HIGH:

"TO SHOW FORTH THY LOVING KINDNESS IN THE MORNING, AND THY FAITHFULNESS EVERY NIGHT." (Psa. 92:1,2).

Believers today have even more to be thankful for than did the Psalmist, for we can rejoice in what God has done for us through Christ and His redeeming work. Thus Paul, by divine inspiration, speaks of...

"Thanks be unto God, Who always causeth us to triumph in Christ!" (II Cor. 2:14) and "Thanks be unto God, Who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ!" (I Cor. 15:57). How appropriate, then, are the exhortations:

"IN EVERYTHING GIVE THANKS" (I Thes. 5:18) and "By Christ, therefore, LET US OFFER THE SACRIFICE OF PRAISE -- GIVING THANKS TO HIS NAME" (Heb. 13:15).

### School Graduates Are Needed For Woman Marines

'A Woman Marines' day is filled with excitement and adventure. Her task is both challenging and rewarding. She awakes each day to a new adventurous future as a member of the Women Marines. "I am confident that every woman who serves with the Marines has nothing but pleasant memories of her duty with the Marine Corps," added local Marine recruiter, Gy-Sgt. C. A. Johnson. Young women from 18 to 30,

who are single and high school graduates this summer. Those who graduates, may now enlist in the Women Marines, but remain at home until graduating from high school. Those who have already graduated may also enlist with such a option.

"The Marines are now offering 120-day Delay Enlistments. Such an enlistment plan enables high school seniors, or those previously graduated, the opportunity of enlisting today, but not depart for training for 120 days. During this time at home the woman applicant's time in service is credited with her active duty service." "We also save Women Marines

The regular 2nd Saturday night singing convention will be held May 13th at the Laurel Fork Church, beginning at 7:30. All singers and listeners are welcome.

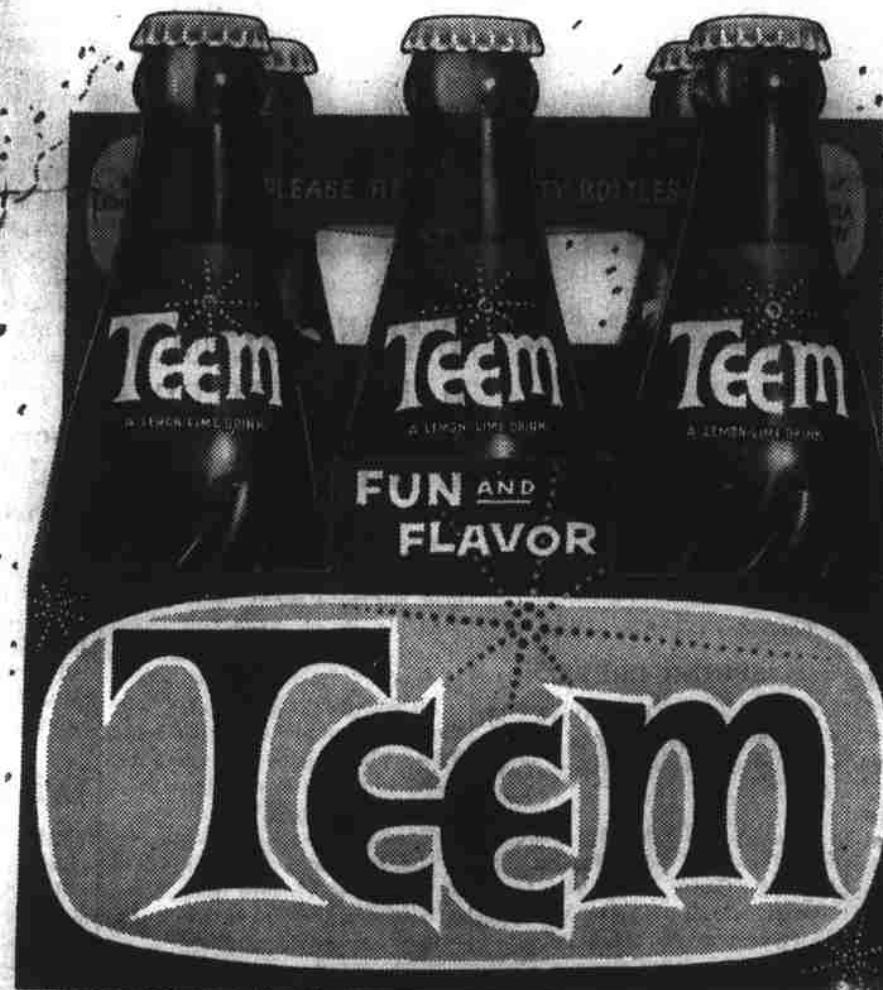
