Farm Exports Set Record; N. C. Shares In Sales

Value And Volume Reach An All-Time High; 9% Above Prior Record

Both value and volume of U. S agricultural exports reached alltime highs in fiscal year 1961, The \$4.9 billion value record was 9 per cent above the prior record of 1957. Export volume in fiscal 1961 topped the previous record

of 1960 by 7 per cent.

Charles R. Pugh, extension agricultural policy specialist at N.
C. State College, says these exports were of special importismes to North Carolina since a large percentage of the state's farm products are sold abroad.

U. S. mobacco exports, for example, reached 508 million pounds in fiscal 1961, ending a four-year decline. This was about 30 per cent of all tobacco production; and for flue-cured, it was 68 per (Continued To Last Page)
