The rifle shooting includes small bore and high powered with prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing positions being emphasized. The trend in International shooting is toward position shooting. Pistol shooting is fired at targets and silhouette targets for peace officers. The officers course is called the Practical Pistol Course (P. P. C.) and is very interesting for all shooters. Regular shooting of pistol is at round targets 25 and 50 yards away.

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Your Social Security

The year 1961 brought exten sive changes in the social security law, all of which were designed to improve the social insurance system. One of the most dramatic changes was the reduction in the amount of work needed to qualify for retirement and survivor bene-

D. H. Butler, field repres tive of the Asheville Social Security Offlice, pointed out that as a result of these changes many changes many workers who have been denied benefits may now be eligible for cash payments. Benefits are not automatic, however, and an application must be filed before any payments can be made.

Butler mentioned that the work requirement was reduced by about 25 percent. Anyone who believes he is affected by this change, should contact the social security office or see the representative. field representative is in Marshall every Wed., beginning at 9:30 a. m., to give information and assistance to Madison County residents on social security matters.
