Intense interest prevailed at the 23 Madison County precinct meetings which were held last Saturday morning.

Are Named

In 20 of the 23 precincts, the Organization Democrats, referred to as the "Ramsey-Ponder" faction, won uncontested victories for precinct chairmen, vice-chairmen and committees but the action in three of the 23 precincts - namely, Walnut, Mars Hill and Middle Fork - clearly pointed to plenty of opposition from opponents of

the Organization candidates. Perhaps the most confusing outcome is that which occurred at Mars Hill.
