Citizens To Vote Saturday For Industrial Development Tax, Comm. Madison County voters will have the opportunity at the Primary Election, May 26, to approve or reject plans for the establishment of a new tax and commission for Madison County. The proposed new commission, if approved, will be known as the Madison County Industrial Development Commission. (Not to be confused with the present Madison County Planning Board). Supporters of the measure to petition and any and all costs or the broad development purposes, such as proved as president planning assistance, resource, labor, location, land use, industrial and other surveys, and advertising. Woters will decide on whether or not a tax levy of 50 per \$100 valuation will be assistant to be present Madison County Planning Board).
