The first official day of school for students will start on Wednesday at 8:30 a. m., when they will register, get assignments, etc. Mr. Anderson said that school buses will run on Wednesday. Just how long Wednesday's sessions will last is not yet known.

To Attend Marshall School

Marshall 7th And 8th Grades To Attend Walnut School; Official Action Expected Today; State Officials Here Yesterday

It was learned from authoritative sources this morning that the State Board of Education is concurring with the Madison County Board of Education and as a result, the Marshall and Walnut schools will be partially consolidated, effective this session which starts next week.

Partial consolidation means that all high school students of the Walnut school will attend school on the Island in the Marshall High School Building and the students of the seventh and eighth grades of the Marshall school will attend school at Walnut.

Although this action is not completely official, it is safe to assume that this consolidation will be official, Emory Robinson, Chairman of the campaign will be discussed and probably today or tomorrow, according to authoritative

chamicals for the extend of these chemicals for the control of grass-hoppers in tobacco. These chemicals may be used as a dust or spray. The chemicals and the amount of actual chemical per acre are as follows:

Aldrin - 2. to 4 ounces actus er acre.

Dieldrin - dust or spray - 1 to

to 1 pound actual per acre.
