Red Cross Fund Drive Underway This Month

\$2,973.00 Is Goal Set For County Services Area Listed

The American Red Cross will be conducting a campaign for funds in the Madison County Area of this Chapter during the month of November. Efforts will be made to secure the maximum of your Red Cross in this area.

The total goal will be \$2,973.00 for the county area. A decision was made by the group of citizens from this area interested in Red Cross that the responsibility for raising this money would be divided into areas by towns, each of the towns of Marshall, Mars Hill and Hot Springs would be responsible for one-third of the goal.

Funds raised will support the programs of Red Cross which include the Blood Program, Home Service, or Services to the Armed Forces and Veterans, First Aid and Water Safety, Nursing Services, Junior Red Cross, and Disaster.

Of the total proposed goal, \$1,180.00 is retained in the local Chapter to support programs and \$1,793.00 is sent to the National Organization to support national programs of disaster, service to military installations, and international programs.

161 PINTS OF BLOOD GIVEN AT MHC OCT. 24

When the Bloodmobile of the Asheville Red Cross Blood Center visited Mars Hill College on Wednesday, October 24, a total of 194 individuals presented themselves as donors and 161 pints of blood were collected.

Other statistics from this operation show the following: 3 residents of Mars Hill donated in addition to the College group.

4 faculty members gave blood, and the remaining 161 pints were given by the student body — 84 boys and 70 girls.

There were 91 "first time" donors.

Miss Virginia Hart of the Physical Education Department was in charge of arrangements for the Bloodmobile visit, and also of Recruitment and scheduling of donors.

"We wish to thank Miss Hart and the students for their cooperation and participation," Elizabeth C. McCutchen, Administrative Director, Asheville Regional Blood Center, said.

WASHINGTON — The White House announced Wednesday night the naval quarantine of Cuba will be resumed at daylight today (Thursday). Air surveillance of the Soviet missile sites in Cuba also will begin again.

The decision was reached by President Kennedy after a conference with his top advisers and after the departure of United Nations Acting Secretary-General U Thant from an attempt to arrange U. N. verification of the dismantling of the bases. The attempt apparently was not successful.

ASCS Relaxing Restrictions On Diverted Acreage

Effective November 1, ASCS will permit farmers to graze acreage which was previously diverted from production of cash crops under the 1962 feed grain program or the 1962 wheat stabilization program. According to Emory Robinson, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, this is a part of a general effort to keep provisions of farm programs in line with practical farming operations.

Robinson cautioned farmers that this grazing authorization applies to all acreage diverted under the feed grain and wheat program except wildlife food plots and other special cases.

Many farmers normally salvage dropped corn and other crop residues by turning livestock on harvested cropland in the late fall. On many farms the animals (Continued To Last Page)

Clyde Candler Scores Only Touchdown For Red Tornadoes

Clyde Candler scored Marshall's only touchdown in the third quarter on a 30 yard run. Mars Hill fullback Don Wood scored for 25 yards and a touchdown in the same period and Robinson again added the extra point. The final score was 21-6. Wood and Robinson were the only players to score touchdowns.
