World's Tallest Television Tower Near Knoxville

Construction has begun on the world's tallest television tower which is being built by WBIR-TV, Knoxville, Tenn., it was stated today by John P. Hart, manager of the station. This new tower, which raises 1750 feet above ground, will be located 15 miles east of Knoxville on Highway 11W. From this increased altitude, the WBIR-TV signal will be projected over a wider area than has been formerly possible at their old location.

Officials state that if work goes as planned, the station should be broadcasting from this tall tower in September.

WBIR-TV is affiliated with the Columbia Broadcasting System.
