NEWS FOR VETERANS

Q—As a veteran's widow figuring out my income and estate for purposes of a pension, can I include the unpaid balance due on the family automobile?

A—Yes, generally any just debt ruled as such by a probate court is also included and considered a just debt by the VA.

Q—Does the VA require a cash down payment to be made by the veteran in connection with a GI loan for purchase of a home?

A—No, but the lender may require one.

Q—May a lender require from the veteran security in addition to the property being purchased?

A—This is between the veteran and the lender. While the Veterans Administration does not require additional security, it does not object if the veteran is willing.
