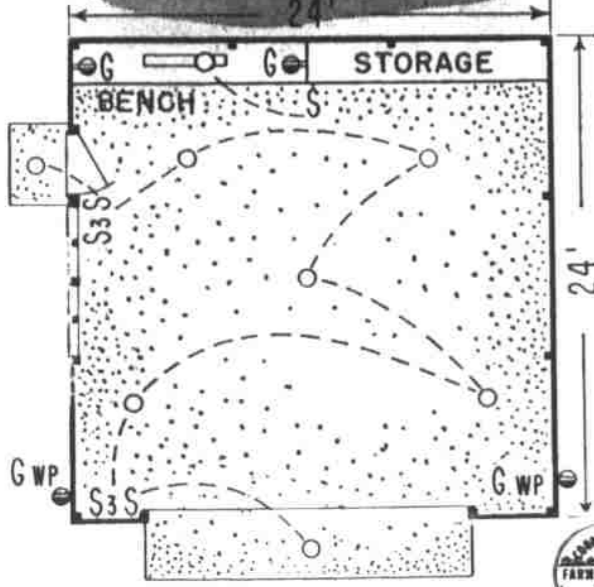
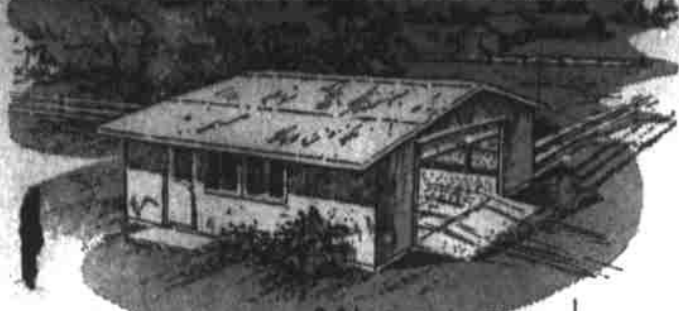


TWO-CAR GARAGE



TWO-CAR GARAGE PLANS OFFERED

Need a new garage, workshop or storage space? Here's a two-car garage plan that may meet those needs.

Of pole construction, this 24-foot square garage has been designed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to match the low lines of modern homes.

The plan exceeds FHA minimum requirements by 3/4 feet in interior length and by 5/8 feet in width.

You may rearrange the doors and windows shown on the plan to suit the site and purpose. Check carefully the manufacturer's instructions for installing an overhead door before building a garage, to allow for clearances and mounting requirements.

Both the pitch of the roof and the direction of the ridge may be changed if you wish. The latter requires a heavy lintel to support the roof trusses over the 16-foot door.

The pole-type garage, Plan No. 5930, does not require the structural support of walls and may be erected as an open shelter or carport. It has a concrete slab floor and provides a post-free interior.

You can order free working drawings of this Plan No. 5930 from your county agent or by writing the extension agricultural engineer at North Carolina State College, Raleigh.

Two Minutes With The Bible

The Bible Is For YOU

No matter which translation of the Bible we examine, one fact stands out with particular emphasis and clarity: The Bible was written for the people, for the populace at large, not for some special class among them.

St. Paul addressed his epistles to both "laity" and "clergy." "To all that be in Rome" (Rom. 1:7), "unto the church . . . at Corinth . . . with all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Cor. 1:2), "unto the churches of Galatia" (Gal. 1:2), "to all the saints . . . at Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Phil. 1:1), etc.

When Paul proclaimed the gospel at Berea his hearers did not even take this great apostle's word for granted, but "searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so," and for this God called them "noble" (Acts 17:11). They were the true spiritual aristocracy of their day.

Our Lord, when on earth, encouraged — even challenged His audacious to "search the Scriptures" for themselves (John 5:39).

Indeed, since God has revealed Himself and His plan of salvation in the written Word, we are responsible, each one for himself, to study the Scriptures. When Dives begged Abraham to be allowed to go and warn his five brothers about the horrors of hades, Abraham replied: "They have Moses and the prophets, let them hear them," and when Dives urged that a word from him would be more effective, Abraham answered, "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead" (Luke 16:29, 31).

Do not depend upon your clergyman to interpret the Scriptures for you but see for yourself what they say, for "every one of us shall give account of himself to God" (Rom. 14:12) and it will not be enough in that day to say: "But my minister or priest told me . . ." You are responsible to "search the Scriptures" for yourself to "see whether these things are so."

Search the Scriptures, especially the Epistles of St. Paul, and learn God's wonderful plan of salvation. "Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15:3). "We have redemption through His blood" (Ephesians 1:7). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

This Is The Law

INHERITANCE OF PROPERTY

A husband executed a will leaving all of his property to his wife. Subsequently he told his wife he wanted to make a new will leaving certain of his property to his son. She persuaded him not to do so, promising to execute a will herself leaving the property to the son.

Relying upon the definite promise, made in the presence of several witnesses, he agreed to let his will stand as written.

The wife did not keep her promise. After her husband's death, she executed a will leaving the property to her sister. Who will get the particular property?

The wife's sister. This was an actual case decided by the Supreme Court of North Carolina some years ago.

Upon the death of the husband, this particular property, along with everything else he owned, became the absolute property of his wife under the provisions of his will.

Oral testimony is not permitted to change the terms of a written will.

The husband in this instance should not have relied upon the promise of his wife. He should have made a new will or revised his old will by means of a properly executed codicil. He could have left by will the particular property outright to his son or to his wife for life and upon her death to his son.

William Taylor, owned three houses. If he died without a will, all of his real property and personal property would have passed automatically under the intestate laws to his only child, a son named John. He did not want to make a will.

In the presence of witnesses, John promised his father that, in accordance with his father's wishes, he would convey the house at 123 North Main Street to his father's sister, Mary, shortly after his father's death.
