If you plan to gas your plant beds this fall, prepare and fertilize in the usual method. Working the fertilizer well into the soil before applying the gas. The temperature and soil conditions are ideal for applying gas. A good ditch should be placed around the beds to prevent surface water from carrying weed seed into the plant bed area. If there are any high weeds near the plant bed site, they should be cut so that the wind cannot carry weed seed into the plant bed area.
