School Lunch Act in 1946, the school lunch program has been extended to all 50 states plus the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, and American Samoa. Great immprovements have been made in management and operation techniques, tieing in the program with plentiful foods information issued by the Agricultural Marketing Service, and now, giving special assistance to distressed areas.

The Agricultural Marketing Serivce is continually making improvements in the operation of the national program and in purchasing foods for use in school lunches. Under a provision of the National School Lunch Act, the Agricultural Marketing Service buys and distributes to participating schools foods that are of high nutritive value and suitable for lunches.
