JOINT RIGHTS TO SAFE DEPOSIT BOXES

May a safe deposit box be rented by two persons?

Yes. More often, however, the box is rented by one person alone, who may in writing appoint another as his deputy or agent to have access to the box, upon presentation of the key.

A safe deposit box in the vault of a bank has been leased by a husband. The husband has given his wife one of the duplicate keys and has appointed her his deputy or agent.

The person who qualifies as the executor or administrator of the

husband's estate. The wife's appointment as her husband's deputy or agent has been terminated by his death.

The statutes of North Carolina require the presence of the clerk of the Superior Court at the opening of a safe deposit box in the vault of a bank "upon the death of any person using or having access to such lock box."

The law imposes upon the clerk of the Superior Court, or his representative, a duty to make an inventory of the safe deposit box, in the presence of a representative of the bank, and to furnish a copy of the inventory to the Commissioner of Revenue, the executor or administrator of the decedent or cotenant of the decedent, and the bank.

If the wife should die before the husband, the husband would not have an immediate free access to the safe deposit box which he has rented in his own name. Since in this case his deceased wife has had access to the box, the presence of the clerk of the Superior Court and the making of an inventory by him is a condition precedent to

the opening of the box for the first time following his wife's death. Where the decedent merely had access to the safe deposit box, the inventory by the clerk of the Superior Court includes only assets in which the decedent had an interest.

Price-Support Operations Being Simplified

With the three goals of making the agricultural price-support programs more effective, less costly and simpler, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced changes in operating provisions for grains and similarly handled commodities. The changes will become effective with the 1964 price support programs. In brief, the new operating procedure:

- 1. Makes farm storage loan money available more promptly after harvest;
2. Provides more incentive for a farmer to redeem and market his loan collateral instead of delivering to COC;
3. Strengthens market prices and increases farm income by providing earlier price support coverage;
4. Places greater responsibility on farmer committees for local administration of the price-support program.

The new procedure should simplify the various programs, USDA officials explained. Under previous conditions, a considerable interval sometimes elapsed before producers could obtain their farm storage loan funds, due to the required exact measurements of quantity and determination of quality factors.

Under the new procedure, the county ASC office representative and the producer will jointly confirm the existence and apparent condition of the commodity. Together they can develop a quantity estimate to which a reasonable safety factor will be applied.

However, at delivery time CCC will accept all of the eligible commodity and settlement will be based on its grade, quality and quantity. Where a producer wants only price support protection without a loan, no farm visit will be made.

In the case of hard wheats, a producer wishing to receive his premium for high quality factors in the loan amount may request that the required tests be made and have the premiums added to the basic price-support loan rate. The county office will draw the samples and the tests will be made at producer expense.

On warehouse storage loans, as in the past, the producer will put up his warehouse receipt as collateral. Price support loan rate then will be based on the settlement value of the quality offered. Quantity eligible will be that shown on the receipt.

Disbursements will be made by the county ASC offices using a CCC loan draft designed so a bank may hold it as an interest-bearing certificate.

There will continue to be final dates for taking out price-support loans. No changes are contemplated in present maturity dates for loans.

Special provisions will be developed later for rice, honey, dry edible beans, peanuts and tung, but in general they will be handled similarly to grains.

Local farmer ASC committees will have more responsibility under the new plan. To lessen the need for detailed administrative instructions, and in the interest of permitting greater promptness in dealing with special crop and weather situations, more opportunity for discretionary actions is to be given State and county ASC

A Place To Live

The Department of Agriculture has announced publication of the 1963 Yearbook of Agriculture, a far-ranging examination of the effects of urbanization and industrialization on many aspects of American life.

Entitled A PLACE TO LIVE, the 608-page book cites a need for discussion, plans, and action by all Americans regarding the use of resources, public services in communities, rural development, educational and economic opportunities for farmers and others whom technological changes have put at a disadvantage.

The 79 chapters were written in nontechnical, informative style by 92 men and women, among the officials of State and Federal Government, college professors, garden club leaders, planning officials, sociologists, and economists.

Some of the specific topics, which indicate the scope, are: Multiple uses of forests and other resources, agricultural in the national economy, values of farmland, farming on the urban fringe, community leadership, the small town, rural housing, finances in communities, technical services in planning, conservation in the suburbs, planning and zoning, highways, garden centers and clubs, family and part-time farms, and examples of solutions to problems brought about by growth and change.

The Yearbooks of Agriculture are published under annual Congressional appropriations. Distribution of the books is mainly by members of Congress.

Robinson, Executive Vice President, Carolina Power & Light Company, 336 Fayetteville Street, Raleigh, North Carolina) for license for constructed Project No. 2380, known as Marshall Project located on French Broad River, in Madison County about two miles below Town of Marshall, State of North Carolina.

The project consists of a concrete masonry dam about 535 feet long and 32 feet high topped with 24 inch flashboards, intake gates and trash racks; a powerhouse integral with the dam housing two vertical shaft turbines having a total installed capacity of 4,500 horsepower directly connected to two generators with a combined capacity of 3,000 kilowatts; and appurtenant facilities.

Protests or petitions to intervene may be filed with the Federal Power Commission, Washington, D. C., 20426, in accordance with the Rules of Practice and Procedure of the Commission (C.F.R. 1.8 or 1.10). The last day upon which protests or petitions may be filed is January 17, 1964.
