Plans were formulated and Coach Ed Morton agreed to serve as Director. He needed help when over 50 young people turned out for instructions. Assistants were obtained and now the program is in full swing with great enthusiasm.

Plans are now completed for instructions in swimming. This added program is wise. As usual, the American Red Cross came in to help and Bob Bender, of the Asheville Area Chapter, is the swimming instructor. Regular sessions will begin next Wednesday.

This is a good sign indeed. It is good for our young boys and girls to receive supervised recreation under careful leadership. It is still better for the young boys and girls to learn to swim. This one feature may some day save one of their lives. Learning to swim should be a prime ambition and accomplishment for everyone.

We congratulate the leaders and the young people on making this summer program so successful in its first year.

Employees Of Burlington Sharing Vacation Bonuses

Greensboro — Vacation bonus payments to non-salaried employees of Burlington Industries, Inc. will total approximately \$5.6 million in the company's 1964 fiscal year, Charles A. McLendon, vice president in charge of personnel announced today.

Some \$3.5 million will be paid to employees of the diversified textile firm in the next few weeks, he said. Bonuses paid last Christmas totaled \$2.1 million.

Over 49,000 employees at Burlington plants in 17 states receive the payments, with the individual amounts depending on length of service. Nearly two-thirds of Burlington's eligible employees receive the equivalent of two-weeks' pay.

The bonuses are paid in addition to benefits provided by Burlington's Profit Sharing Retirement plan for non-salaried employees. Members of the plan, in 1963, had approximately \$4.3 million credited to their accounts, which was equivalent to about 3.5 per cent of the member employee wages.

More than 40 miles of cool, clear trout streams stocked two days each week with Rainbow, Brook, and Brown trout ranging in size from 7 to 15 inches.

Advice from Indian Guides about good fishing spots and bait to use. Four conveniently located stations for securing permits and information and reporting your catch. All anglers over 12 years of age must have a Cherokee Fish Management Area daily permit. Permits are \$1.00 plus 3% tribal tax for a total of \$1.03 per day. A North Carolina Fishing License is required of all persons over 16, but no special state trout license is needed. N. C. non-resident license is \$1.65 per day, \$3.75 for 5 days.

Fishing permitted in managed streams between 6:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. Thursday through Monday each week to Oct. 31st. Streams are closed for re-stocking Tuesday and Wednesday of each week.
