Bond Sales In County \$31,831 For First Quarter

According to C. L. Radfai Jr., Madison County Volunteer Chairman for the U. S. Savings Bonds Program, the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds in North Carolina during the first quarter of this year exceeded 25 percent of the state's annual quota of \$53,100,000. Cumulative sales of Series E and H Bonds for the first quarter amounted to \$13,441,108.

During the month of March Series E Bonds in the state showed an increase of 1.2 percent over March a year ago while Series H Bonds showed a decline of over 51 percent. The combined sales of E and H Bonds for the month were off 4.6 percent from March of last year.

Sales in Madison County for the first quarter amounted to \$31,831. This is 18.2 percent of the county's annual quota of \$175,230.

ACP HELP YET AVAILABLE

Farm operators within Madison County who have not as yet utilized the help available to them on farm practices designed to retard or prevent soil erosion, have an opportunity to yet do so, according to Emory Robinson, chairman of Madison County Agricultural and Stabilization Committee.

The chairman stated cost-sharing through the county ACP is yet available to farm operators who haven't enrolled in this voluntary program if a farm need exists. He said the recommended spring seeding date for establishing a vegetative cover of grasses and/or legumes ends on May 1 but that other practices such as the use of lime or fertilizer to improve presently established vegetative covers or tile drainage could be performed during the entire year when weather conditions are favorable.

In conclusion, Robinson urged operators who have soil conservation problems which can be met by utilization of the ACP to contact the ASCS office in Marshall for the details of the program, if they have not already done so and are interested.
