IT IS NOW TIME TO LIME

Why so early? Lime takes time to react with the soil; therefore, it should be applied as far in advance of planting as possible to give maximum response for next year's crops. Also weather conditions are usually better for spreading lime in the fall or early winter than they are in the spring. Since lime does not move readily in the soil it should be well mixed with the plow layer for best and quickest results. Applying it before breaking the land is a good practice to follow.

Now is a good time to apply lime to your fields for next year's crops, if you haven't already done so, reminds Harry Silver, County Extension Chairman. But first have your soils tested to determine how much, if any, lime is needed, warns Mr. Silver, because too much lime can be just as bad as too little. A soil test is the only way to accurately determine lime needs, so why guess and take a chance of applying too much or too little.

A good liming program is essential for top yields and profit.
