Bill Threatens

The bill, if passed, would require TVA to go to the Interior Department for approval of dam construction and other plans which it now has the authority to go ahead with, Smith said.
The plan under consideration provides for construction of several multi-purpose dams on tributaries of the Upper French Broad River in Transylvania, Henderson, Buncombe, Haywood and Madison counties.
The commission, on motion of David Felmet of Haywood County, voted to write Congressman Roy A. Taylor of the 11th District, and Alton Lennon of the 7th District, and Sens. Sam J. Ervin Jr. and B. Everett Jordan, expressing opposition to passage of the bill.

The motion as passed also carried the recommendation that all "friends of the project" also be encouraged to write to the representative asking him to oppose passage.
Smith told the commission members that National Wildlife Federation officers had testified in favor of passage, and had charged that the TVA plan ignored the fish and wildlife values of the Upper French Broad area and the Tellico project on the Little Tennessee River in Tennessee.

Smith said the Wildlife people had also charged TVA with a plan "to desecrate" the wildlife area, and, in effect, to ram a plan down the throats of the area people.
Kermit Edney, chairman of the commission, pointed out that TVA came into the area with a plan at the invitation of three Western North Carolina groups. TVA, Edney said, had altered the plan considerably, and had made the current plan with the "full cooperation of the commission."

"Only this week," Edney said, "the boards of county commissioners in each of the five counties have written to Gov. Dan Moore fully endorsing the plan to build the series of multi-purpose dams in the area."
Edney said the wildlife people were also misrepresenting the facts. Much of the opposition has been centered on a permanent lake that would flood Sycamore Flats on Davidson River. However, Edney said, no such permanent dam is planned. Instead a dry dam is planned, which would flood the area only in the event of considerable rainfall.

The commission was reminded that, contrary to charges by wildlife interests, less than half of one per cent of WNC trout streams would be permanently flooded.
The whole plan has been presented to the N. C. State planning Task Force, L. D. Hyde, executive director of the commission, said.

The water resources plan, Edney said, is only a part of an over-all effort to develop the entire resources of the area including human, land, water, industrial and recreational.
Hyde told the commission that a number of industries had expressed interest in locating plants in the five-county area.
