ng Says "Question As To Whether We can Afford The Tax Measure"

Washington - President Johnon proposed Monday the biggest ncrease in Social Security benefits in 30 years. He said it would take 1.4 million older Americans out of poverty this year.

But the President's proposals, sent to Congress in a special message, include increases in Social Security taxes that would double by 1974 the amount deducted from paychecks.


The scope of the proposed benefit increases, ranging from at least 15 per cent for all recipients to 59 per cent for the 2.5 million receiving minimum benefits, was outlined earlier in Johnson's Jan. 10 State of the Union measure.

Monday, he spelled out the price which would be paid both, by extending the amount of income on which Social Security taxes are levied and by raising the tax rate.

Currently, Social Security taxes, including medicare, amount to 4.4 per cent of income up to \$6,600 a year, for an annual total of \$290.40 for an individual receiving that much pay.

Johnson proposes that the taxable base be raised next year to \$7,800, which would lift the maximum tax to \$343.20. The tax rate, which had been scheduled to climb to 4.9 per cent in 1969, would go instead to 5 per cent, for a maximum of \$890.00. The President's message calls
