> Ingredients must be listed by mmon names and in order of their importance on one panel of the package, but not necessarily on the front display panel. If a product's ingredients are standardized by the Flood and Drug Administration (for example, mayonnaise), any optional ingredients must be listed. And if the proportion of ingredients is important for comparing value, proportions must be stated.

> The Name, Address and Zip Code of the manufacturer, packer or distributor are also required somewhere on the package.

> Under this year's Feed Grain Diversion Program, the designated diverted acreage may be grazed up until May 1. Under previous years' programs, April 1 was the cut off grazing period. The diverted acreage may be grazed this fall, starting on October 1. There can be no harvesting from the diverted acreage during the calendar year.

> In conclusion, Ramsey said that any of the 465 farmers who enrolled in this year's feed grain diversion program with questions on the program requirements are encouraged to visit the county ASCS office in Marshall where the information will be supplied.
