According to an advertisement in this issue, Clyde R. Mitchell, of Old Fort, is now this area's distributor of U. S. Rustic cedar homes.

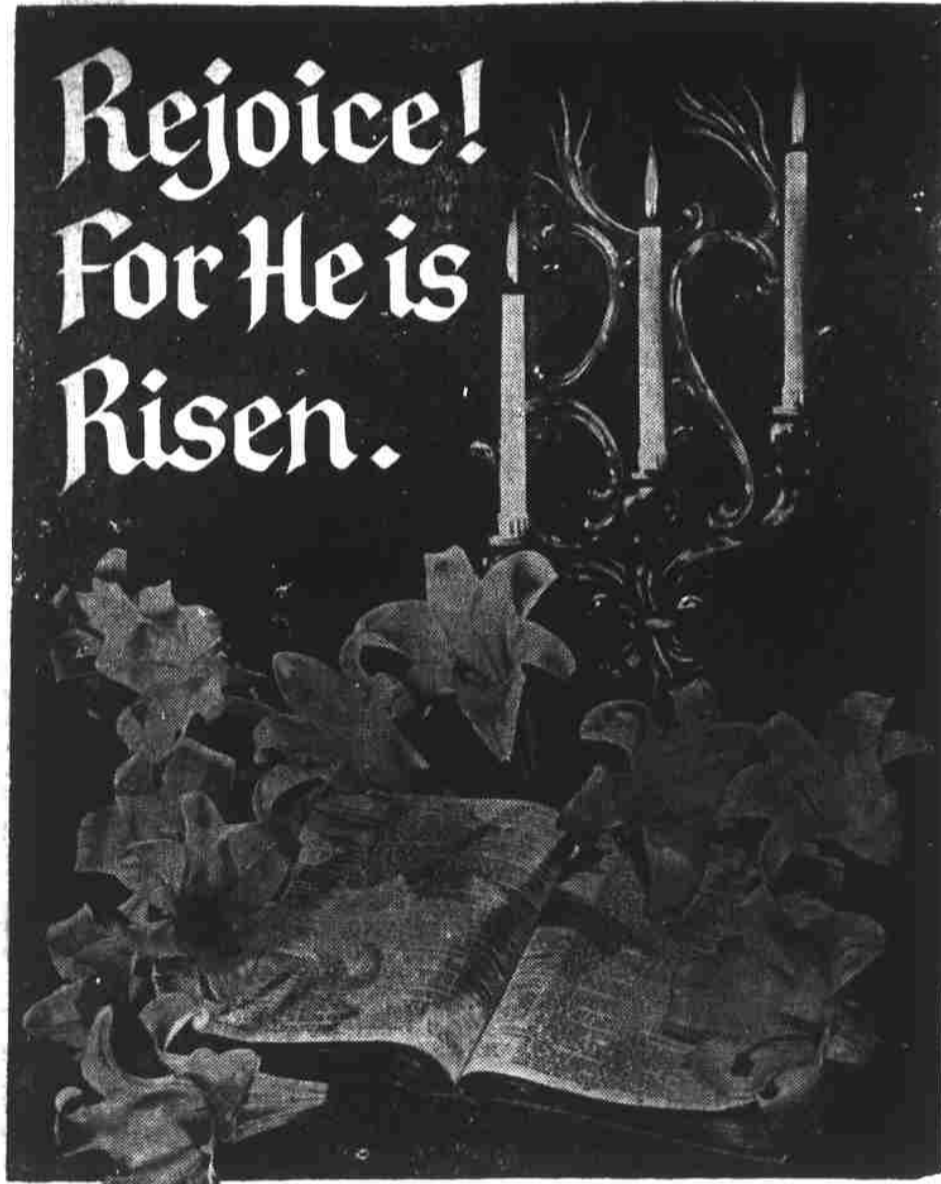
His territory includes Madison, Buncombe, McDowell and Rutherford Counties.
