Burlington's Hot Springs Plant Announces Project

Investment Of Project Is \$1½ Million; Work To Begin Soon

The Hot Springs Plant of Burlington Industries has announced a building program that will increase the plant size by 24,000 square feet and increase employment by an estimated 35 employ-

Plant Manager Truman Melton said construction is expected to begin within the next month or so on addition to the manufacturing plant and reconstruction of the warehouse. The project will also include improvements in existing air conditioning, installation of some new machinery and modernization of existing manufacturing

The new addition, when completed, equipped and in operation, will represent a new investment of approximately 1 and 1/2 million dollars, Mr. Melton said.

The Hot Springs plant has been in operation for the past 15 years and is one of the county's greatest assets. The new project is the first addition to the manufacturing area.
