Income Taxes Aren't Nhat They Used To Be

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by the Publie Information Office of the North Carolina District of Federal Internal Revenue Service. If you wish to have a free booklet which describes, in detail, any of the tax law changes mentioned in the article, you should send your request to Public Information Officer, IRS, 320 South Ashe Street, officially establish the Cradle of Hospital as the result of a broken Greensboro, N. The new surtax will probably send you scurrying to find out how much it will cost you personally. More than likely you'll be surprised at the relatively small increase. More important, we may tend to overlook that this is the first increase in Federal taxes since 1951. We may also have forgotten the many tax changes Congress has passed in the last 10 to 15 years which have professional forestry management eased the Federal tax burden for nearly everyone.

Let's take a brief look at a few of these changes.

If, for example, your child earned as much as \$600 back in 1953, you weren't allowed to claim him as a dependent regardless of the amount of your support. Today you can claim your child as a dependent, regardless of the size of his income, if you furnish the major portion of his support during the year and he is a fulltime student or under age 18 on the last day of the year.
