Two Minutes With The Bible

YOU CAN BE AGAINST US?

And is FOR sinners and desires good. He PROVED this by dying for their sins Himself as the Son at Calvary. But if it is so, how much more must you with regard to His own men who have trusted Christ their Savior?

How often - and how significantly - the Apostle Paul uses the word "FOR US" in this connection!

In Eph. 5:2 we read that "Christ... loved us, and hath given Himself FOR US." In Rom. 5:8 we are told that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died FOR US." In II Cor. 5:21: "God hath made Him to be sin FOR US." And in Gal. 3:13 we read: "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse FOR US."

And the love that brought Him down from heaven to die in shame and disgrace for our sins is not affected by our many failures as Christians now.

In Heb. 9:24 we read that our Lord has ascended to heaven "now to appear in the presence of God FOR US." In Rom. 8:34 we learn that He is "at the right hand of God" to "make intercession FOR US." And in Heb. 7:25 we read that He is able to save us "unto the uttermost" because "He ever lives to make intercession FOR US."

Our failures now, after having trusted Christ as Savior, may - and should - trouble OUR CONSCIENCE and thus hinder our fellowship with God, but this does not change the fact that we are God's dear children through faith in Christ, who died for ALL our sins, and unworthy though we still may be, God would have us come into His presence and be spiritually renewed. Our Lord's intercession for us in time of failure means most of all. As a boy the writer often sang an old church hymn, part of which went thus:

Five bleeding wounds He bears, Received at Calvary, They pour effectual prayers, They strongly plead for me. Forgive him, oh, forgive, they cry, Nor let that ransomed sinner die.

"What shall we then say to these things: IF GOD BE FOR US WHO CAN BE AGAINST US? (Rom. 8:31).

This credit is available to help farmers finance their operations at their normal level only until such time as they are in a financial position to return to their private or cooperative creditors. The interest rate is three per cent per annum on the unpaid balance. These loans are secured normally by crop lien.

ous service in a position of great responsibility as Sergeant Major, United States Army Training Center, United States Army Air Defense Center, Fort Bliss, Texas from September 1966 to May 1968. Throughout this period, Sergeant Major Ammons demonstrated outstanding professional skill and resourcefulness in a demanding, complex assignment. He assumed leadership of the Noncommissioned Officer Corps, supervised individual orientation and established policies for performance, appearance and conduct standards. Genuinely concerned with the problems affecting the soldier as an individual, he offered sound personal guidance and his diligence resulted in a cohesive organization where each person was a valuable and necessary team member. Sergeant Major AMMONS established improved procedures to provide noncommissioned officers with the timely, accurate information concerning all command actions and he encouraged individual participation in official actions to increase enlisted personnel prestige and morale. Additionally, to reduce the Drill Sergeant School attrition rate, he devised a system for recruiting and selecting qualified candidates, for counseling deficient students and re-cycling those who showed definite Drill Sergeant potential but needed additional training. ter, 3 lbs. Rolled Wheat, 4 lbs. Grits, 3 lbs. Rolled Oats, 4-12-oz. Cans Dried Eggs, 8-14 1/2-oz. cans Evaporated Milk, 4 Bottles Juice - Prune / Grape / Apricot (changes each month), 4-30-oz. cans Chopped Meat, 6 lbs. Cheese, 3 lbs. Raisins, 2 lbs. Split Peas, 4-16-oz. bottles Syrup, 4-No. 303 cans Vegetables - beans/tomatoes.

Persons who have been ineligible in the past to receive surplus commodities, due to their income, may now be eligible under the new scale. Any one who is not receiving surplus commodities and feels that he is eligible under these new regulations should contact their local Welfare Department for further information or certificates.

In Madison County the Opportunity Corporation of Madison-Buncombe County has recently started furnishing transportation to those persons who receive surplus commodities but have been unable to get to the warehouse to pick them up due to the lack of transportation.

20 employees each. Elsewhere in the United States, there are 89 percent in this category. In the State of North Carolina, there are 88 percent.

As to the amount of employment provided by local business firms - small, medium and large - the report shows a total of 930 people on their payrolls in jobs covered under social security.

Those not taken into account are farm workers, government employees, self-employed persons and domestic workers, in the main.

The employment ratio in the local area has been above average in the last few years but, even more pronounced, has been the increase in the size of payrolls.

Taxable payrolls subject to social security have climbed from \$3,624,000 in 1965, when a similar survey was made, to the current total of \$4,236,000. It was an increase of approximately 17 percent.
