Employers Bill Questioned **NEW SELF-HELP** ENDS TUESDAY; **NOW IN COUNTY**

By LINDA HARRELL, Assistant Home Economics Extension Agent Self-Help Housing is being introduced to the county by the TVA Pilot Project in an effort to help solve Madison's housing problems.

HOUSING PLAN

Self-Help Housing provides the means whereby a low-income family with no money for a down payment can finance a plot of land, finance the building materimonths later with 35% equity in guilty, racing. a new three bedroom home.

Self-Help Housing may be an answer for the lowest income families that can obtain a loan from the Farmers Home 'Administration. Generally speaking, three families that want to build a self-help house agree to work together by exchanging labor. The time required to build the homes vary with the amount of time that the individuals could spend working on the houses. Outside of enjoying better living conditions, the families also have the opportunity to get new skills, self-confidence and pride of ownership. If enough interest is shown in the project, there are possibilities of hiring a trained carpenter who will act as a foreman to supervise the building. The service of this man will be free to
