PEACE ON EARTH?

When Christ was born of Mary, the angels praise God and sang: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14).

This glad carol of the angels seems farther from the truth today than it ever was, and as a result many have become cynical and have concluded that the Bible is not true; that the angels' song was but a pleasant, hopeful stead of peace.

Our Lord was indeed the longpromised King, through whom were to enjoy peace and true prosperity. John the Baptist appeared as the King's herald. The twelve apostles went forth "preaching THE GOSPEL OF THE KINGDOM" (Matt. 4:23). The four Gospel records are filled with proofs and demonstrations of Christ's royal rights. But the King was rejected, as God had prophesied He would be at His first advent (II Pet. 1:11). Over His cross Pilate placed a sign, saying: "This is Jesus, THE KING of the Jews." Christ's rejection is also a won-

derful period of GRACE. When sin had risen to its height ,God SAVED Saul of Tarsus, the leader of the world's rebellion against Christ, and sent him forth to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24) the good news that "Christ died for our sins," and that any sinner may be reconciled to God by faith in Christ. This is why the Bible calls the divine administration under which we are living "the dispensation of the grace of God" (Eph. 3:2). So, while "peace on earth" awaits a future day, WE may now have "peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1).
