LAWSON MARLER ATTENTION NOT GUILTY OF

Incident Occurred In 1967; Goforth Died In May,

Lawson Marler, of the Sandy Mush section of Madison County, was found not guilty of the murder of Robert "Bob" Goforth, of the Walnut Gap section, at superior court here Wednesday morning. The jury deliberated for 20 minutes before acquitting Marler.

The incident occurred at the home of Marler in December, 1967. Goforth died in May, 1968.

Judge J. W. Jackson instructed the jury to either find a verdict of second degree murder, manslaugh ter, or not guilty.
