Grant Could Benefit Towns And Rural Areas In County

Approval of a \$6,500 Farmers Home Administration grant for Madison County, to promote effi-cient and orderly development of water and sower systems in rusal communities was announced this week byl Congressman Roy

Mrs. Frances C. Ramsey, chair man of the Planning Agency, said that the Comprehensive Water and Sewer System Planning Grant will provide information to avoid overlapping, duplication, underdesign, or overdesign of the water and sewer facilities that will be constructed in rural Madison County.

The plans financed by the

Farmers Home Administration grant will cover all of Madison County with the exception of towns with a population in excess of 5,500 people. The plans will be developed by an engineering firm and will project population growth with provisions for other funcderly growth of the county.

Projections and provisions for future growth will be made for the next 5 to 10 years and for the next 20 years or more. The Comprehensive Water and Sewer Plan will be developed in harmony with (Continued on Last Page)

ary of \$325 a month.
