The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina purchased property in Asheville this week in which to begin operation of a home for unwed mothers.

The home, located at 240 Pearson Drive, Asheville, will serve about 12 girls at any one time, or approximately 36 residents a

The Asheville area was selected, according to Dr. W. R. Wagoner, president of the Children's Homes, as the site of the new demonstrated interest of residents of Asheville and Buncombe Coun-

Trustees and administrators of the Homes have been planning 28-year-old woman drowned. of non tax paid liquor, guilty, \$50 with various leaders in the Asheville area for the establishment begin operation soon.

A recent survey conducted by the development department of the Children's Homes indicated that maternity home services in North Carolina are inadequate to meet the needs of unwed mothers. and their offspring. The survey revealed that there are only three such homes in the state with a combined capacity for approximately 114 girls at any one time.

Action Toward Consolidation Aired At Meeting Here Mon.


Meeting Of Groups Termed "Fruitful"; Motions Passed


