Practice caution in the use of agricultural chemicals. Many farmers remember their experience last year with a sucker control chemical called P&G Agent 120. Leaf drop occurred in many fields after the use of this chemical. A new one, called OFF SHOT T, has been placed on the market. Like the other one, it is a contact killer. This means the suckers must be burned out by coming in contact with the chemical. Even though these materials have been cleared for use, they should be used cautiously. If you decide to try them, do so on a

few rows. There is too much risk involved in using your entire acreage to test a material of this nature. In addition, be sure to read the label. Much damage in the use of any chemical may be prevented by following instructions.
